What is a Jewish place of worship?	Jewish place of worship is called a Synagogue or a Schul. They are different depending on whether the Jewish community is Orthodox (traditional) or Reform (modernised). Reform: men and women sit together, some services in English, might be a choir, girls' heads uncovered, bimah close to Ark. Orthodox: service in Hebrew, no choir/ instruments, men and women separate, all men and women's heads covered, bimah in centre. Christians see the church itself as the body of Christ- acting on behalf of Jesus in the world. Church provide lots of help and support, as well as		Bimah	the altar part or sanctuary in ancient and Orthodox churches.
