Styles and Techniques

Collage

- Beatriz Milhazes uses shapes in different sizes and overlaps them to create images. She uses coloured papers, sweet wrappers, food packaging, plastic and paints to create her images.

-She repeats circles, squares, stripes, flowers and other simple shapes throughout her work.



Collagraphs

-Milhazes uses and creates collagraphs to print. She creates raised patterns onto a surface in order to create her own printing stamp. She then uses these both in her paintings and collage art.



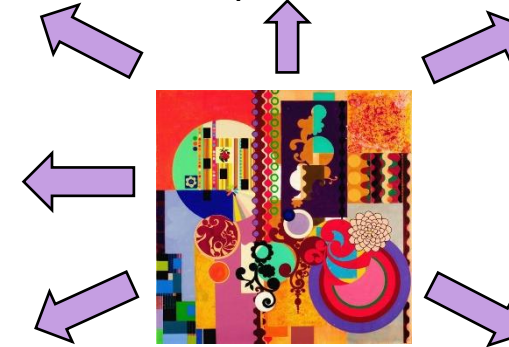
How do I make a collage like Milhazes?

Step 2: Fold, twist, curl your shapes to create new shapes and new textures.

Step 3: Begin to arrange your shapes on your animal image – use over lapping and layering techniques to create new textures and patterns.

Step 4: Create a collagraph using card. Create a raised pattern using card, lolly sticks and pipe cleaners.

Step 1: Begin to cut some simple shapes in different sizes out of varied different materials. Squares, circles and rectangles.



Step 5: Use the collagraph to print a pattern over your completed collage piece to give it more texture, colour and shape.

Things you'll need: Coloured paper, card and materials, scissors, glue and paint.
