From their very first day in Year 1, children at Hawthorn Primary School and Bridgewater School in Newcastle's West End begin learning an instrument. The benefits might start in the classroom, but they reach far into the local community.

Music-making skills, confidence, self-esteem, health, well-being and resilience improve through making music together as part of daily life. We think that's pretty wonderful.
