#### Year 6 Science show



The children made stops on the journey; they used their geography skills to create maps to show the area and the bridges as well as using their art skills to sketch the bridges that they could see. Giraffe class also spoke to some local

fisherman who had caught a flatfish and he spoke to them about the different types of fish they catch in the Tyne. Year 5 were also lucky enough to see the Millennium Bridge

open to allow passage to a boat before getting an ice lolly for the walk back.

James from the Honeybees said, "It was really fun and I loved aiming the arrow for the target."


Y3 Pasta Making

#### Message from Mrs Robson

In September it will be legally required for all children to be in school for at least 32.5 hours per week. School starting time is 8.40am. Finish times will vary as they do now but all year groups will do at least 32.5 hours.

Children who are over 8 years old can walk home alone provided parents have signed a letter giving permission.

Teachers will be available for a quick chat at the end of the day but longer conversations need an appointment booked.

#### Holiday fines

Just a reminder that we need holiday forms completed for any child taking time off during term time. No holidays will be authorised and parents will be fined if their child's absence exceeds 4.5 days (which is 10 sessions or more) from September.

# WEST Schools' Trust

We are part of the West End Schools'

Trust (WEST) with Broadwood, Canning Street, St Johns, Wingrove, Hawthorn St Paul's and Moorside Primary Schools. We work very closely together to provide the best education for all our children. Other Trust partners are Newcastle University, Centre For Life, Healthworks, Tyne and Wear Archive Museums and Newcastle Local Authority. We are also part of the West End Children's Community. The Trust newsletter will be shared on our whole school Dojo page this week and in the Autumn Term we will be welcoming Lemington Riverside into our Trust.

Remember to make sure we have up to date contact numbers for you in case we have to get in touch in an emergency. We also sent text messages to keep parents informed so it is vital our contact details are up to date. We also use Dojo so please make sure you are signed up.

#### Medical Needs

If your child has a medical need or condition can you let the school office know so it can be recorded on our system, that way all staff who need to know will. A care plan may need to be made with the school nurse and staff may need specialised training. We also need to know any changes that may occur immediately.



### **Attendance and Punctuality**

Please ensure your child arrives on time every day and if they are poorly you **must** telephone the office on the first day of absence

and every day they are off on **2745290** thank you.

All *money* paid into school should either be paid directly to the school office or through the class teacher in a labelled

envelope. This prevents any loss or confusion over money paid.

Can I please remind all adults that the school and grounds is a no smoking zone and no one is allowed to smoke in this area. In fact it is illegal and anyone caught can face prosecution. Thank you for your support in this.
